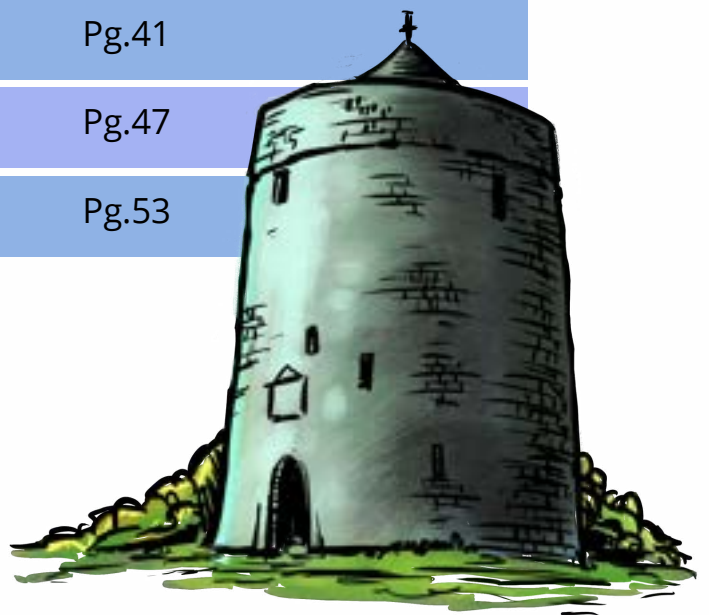

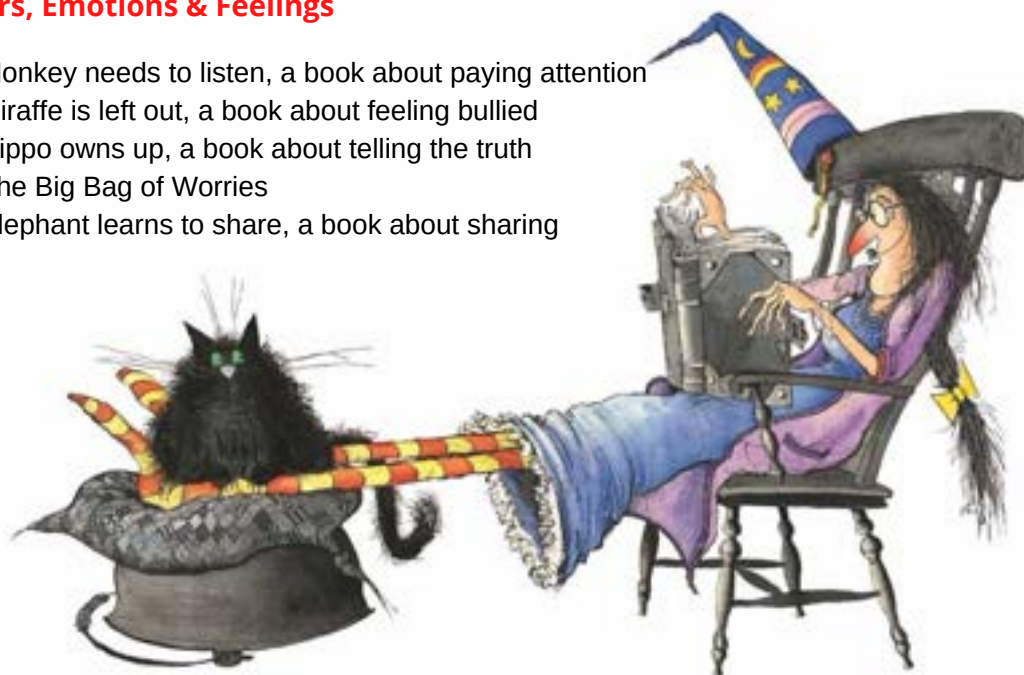

Reading Schemes

A reading scheme is a series of books that's structured to help children learn to read.

They include books of all genres, including fiction and non-fiction. There are many different reading schemes available - all are levelled to match **The Institute of Educations 'Book Bands for Guided Reading'**. Book Bands are used across different reading schemes to indicate the reading level of each book, each of which has its own colour.

- Book Bands indicate the reading level of each book in the scheme,
- The books vary in a number of ways including layout, vocabulary and length.
- The difference between each colour band is very gradual, so that children do not experience great difficulty moving up through the schemes.

Progress through the bands is not automatic and it is important to ensure that children working in the early bands have secure understanding as they move on to more challenging texts.

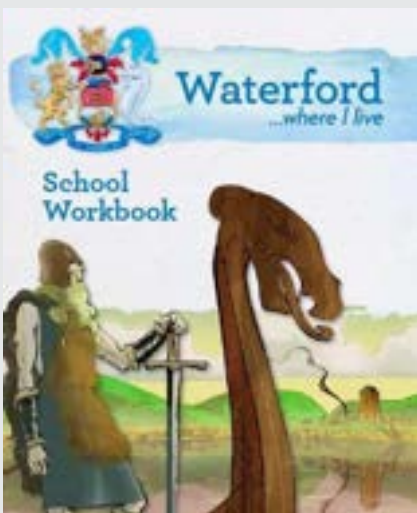
TTRS is available from Waterford libraries in 12 week blocks, a teacher or educator can avail of the service for one or more students in their class.

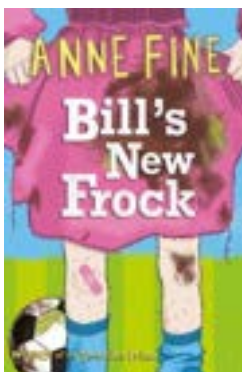
The Magic Finger

Then a storm devastates everything. It seems there is little hope...that is until the sailing ship The Zanzibar is wrecked on the island's rocks and everything changes...

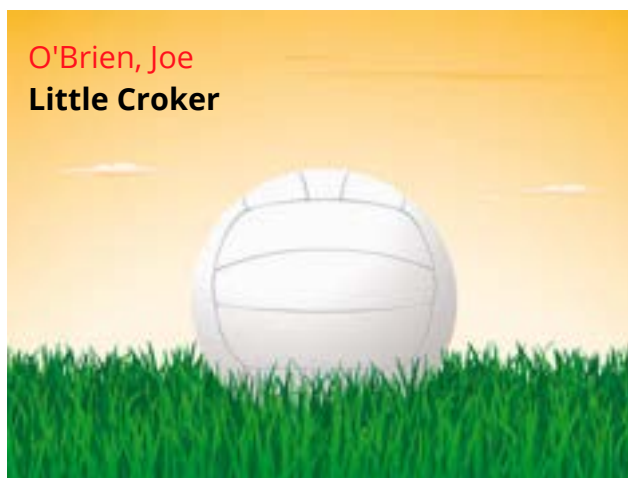
Why the Whales came
